

# Azerbaijan



## **Country Overview:**

Location: Southwestern Asia, bordering the Caspian Sea, between Iran and Russia, with a small European portion north of the Caucasus range

Size: 86,600 square kilometers

Population: 9,590,159 (July 2013

Capital: Baku (Baki, Baky)

Export-commodities: oil and gas 90%, machinery, cotton, foodstuffs

Import-commodities: machinery and equipment, oil products, foodstuffs, metals, chemicals

Currency: Azerbaijani mantas (ANZ)

Religion: Muslim 93.4%, Russian Orthodox 2.5%, Armenian Orthodox 2.3%, other 1.8%

Government Type: republic

Chief of State: President Ilham Aliyev (since 31 October 2003)

Head of Government: Prime Minister Artur RASIZADE (since 4 November 2003); First Deputy Prime Minister Yaqub EYYUBOV(since June 2006)

Language: The official language is Azerbaijani or "Azeri", a Turkic language. In addition, 38% of Azerbaijanis speak Russian fluently to accommodate Russian domination of the economy and politics.

# Meetings and **Negotiations**

- -Azeris appreciate warm and friendly greetings.
- -Punctuality **is not** paramount. Arriving within 30 minutes of the stipulated time is socially acceptable.
- Men greet each other with a handshake, a kiss on the cheek and "salaam" (literally 'peace' but meaning 'hello').
- Women hug and kiss each other once on the left cheek. Azeri women do not generally shake hands among themselves, although many will shake hands with a foreigner.
- Males should wait and see if a woman extends her hand (although most religious may not). If they do extend it—shake it lightly.
- **First names** are generally used in social situations if the speakers

- are of similar ages. If you do not know the person well, use their first name followed by an appropriate title.
- Younger people always initiate greetings with older people.
- Use your right hand to eat and to pass things (like business cards).
- -Expect a great deal of **bargaining** and haggling. Azeris are tough negotiators.

#### **Business Attire**

- -Dress casually but smartly. Never wear tight or revealing clothing.
- -For your first meeting, make sure you dress sharply looking like a successful westerner.

#### **Behavior**

- -If there are many people present shake hands with everyone.
- -Table manners are **fairly formal**. If in doubt watch what others do.

- Remain standing until invited to sit down. You may be shown to a particular seat.
- -Keep your elbows off the table and your hands above the table when eating.

## Gift Giving

- -Gifts are **not** usually brought to a first business meeting.
- -Gifts should be offered three times; it is proper to refuse a gift twice and accept on the third offering.
- -Gifts are generally not opened when received. It is best to wrap gifts nicely.

## **Appropriate Gifts:**

-Fruit, pastries and/or flowers

#### **Gifts to Avoid:**

- -An even number of flowers in colors of white, yellow, and red
- -Avoid giving alcohol unless you are certain your host partakes.

# Business Tips continued

## Conversation

- -Although direct communication is seen as a positive, one also has to be careful to employ such directness.
- -If it is a new or formal relationship, diplomacy is critical. If the relationship is well developed a little more honesty is fine.
- -Discussions will often start slowly over tea and the topics of discussion may be completely irrelevant. However, this is the make or break part of your relationship.

-Always maintain eye contact while speaking since Azeris take this as a sign of sincerity.

#### **Topics to Discuss:**

- -Azeris culture, climatic zones (of which they have nine), picturesque countryside and their ancient
- -At the initial meeting, it is a good idea to meet your Azeri counterpart on a personal level. Ask about his/ her family without prying. Questions about the children will

be welcomed.

-Find out about their work, role and company.

#### **Topics to Avoid:**

- -Do not discuss local politics. Try to avoid discussing religion. Islamic values of Azeris vary from person to person.
- -Avoid coarse language as part of humor or otherwise. It can be considered offensive.
