#### **Country Overview:**

Location: Central Asia, bordering the Caspian Sea, between Iran and Kazakhstan.

Size: 488,100 sq km

Population: 4,997,503

Capital: Ashkhabad

Export-commodities: Gas, oil, petrochemicals, cotton, oil, butter, wine, fish, and salt

Import-commodities: Machinery and equipment, chemicals, food and live animals

Religion: Muslim 89%, Eastern Orthodox 9%, unknown 2%

Ethnic groups: Turkmen 85%, Uzbek 5%, Russian 4%, other 6%

Government type: secular democracy and a presidential republic

## Negotiations

- Do not be surprised if the person you are meeting arrives late or starts the meeting after the agreed time. However, punctuality is expected of foreigners.

- When you greet the person you are meeting with, shake hands firmly and have good eye contact. However, if you are introduced to a **woman** as a male, it is advisable to wait and see if a hand is extended. If it is not, then **do not** try to shake hands. Avoid touching and prolonged eye contact with women.

- Do not be surprised if the Turkmen do not take **notes**; make sure to leave a business card so they have your contact details.

- Turkmen's are generally likely to conduct their dialogue in Russian, speaking through a capable English language interpreter. If you are not a Turkmen or Russian speaker you are advised to hire a good interpreter.

## **Business Attire**

- Turkmen usually have high expectations of the way western business people should dress and tend to judge you immediately on the basis of this. It is best to try and dress conservatively and smartly.

- Turkmen women might be wearing a **scarf** covering their hair.

## Behavior

- Turkmen's are heavy smokers. If you wish to smoke it is advisable to ask permission and always remember to offer them a cigarette.

- If you are asked to attend a lunch or dinner after the meeting, be aware that this is traditionally coupled with strong alcohol such as vodka or cognac. If you try to refuse, you risk offending your Turkmenistan associates, so accept a drink, but be careful not to consume too much.

- In restaurants it is traditional for the man to pay. If you are a wom-

## **Business Tips Continued**

### Conversation

- When your business partner arrives, you will begin with banter and conversation centered not on business, but on many other topics. Once you get down to business, you may be overwhelmed by the amount of argument and haggling. People in the Middle East love to talk, discuss, wrangle, and argue.

- People in Turkmenistan are well informed about a wide range of non-business topics. They will expect you to be able to reciprocate, so be prepared to show your interest in and knowledge of Turkmenistan.

- Never say **no** directly; it causes shame. Find other ways to express disagreement.

- There is also a tradition that the person who invites someone to restaurant also **pays** the bill.

## Gift Giving

- It is worth preparing some small gifts to hand out to your business contacts.

- Gifts should be wrapped and they will most likely be opened in private.

- Gifts should not be too expensive, so as not to be viewed as a bribe.

## **Appropriate Gifts:**

- Pens, solar calculators, promotional materials, compasses, items from your region/culture, good quality chocolates

## **Gifts to Avoid:**

- Liquor, perfume, products or food from scavenger animals, leather goods from pig, souvenirs
